#### **From Our President**

### How Baseball Saved My Legal Career

"To succeed in baseball, as in life, you must make adjustments"

Baseball is magical. It comes along every spring, bringing sunshine and optimism. I fell in love with baseball at an early age. The smell of fresh cut grass on the diamond, a brand new glove, and the opening of a new Topps package baseball card was intoxicating. Every summer morning I would rush out the door at the crack of dawn and hurry down the street to Rowland Park in hopes of being selected for the first of several games that would be played that day. Later it was the excitement of our Mighty Mite team's practice or the thrill and heart pounding drama of game day that attracted my interest. It was one of the few things I was fairly good at. Each night I would sit on our front porch and listen to the Cleveland Indians announcer, Herb Score, tell us about a new hot prospect while the Tribe bottomed out in last place again. I was sure I would end up a big leaguer someday, and be the missing link to lead them back to the World Series (I later recognized my lack of ability to hit a curve ball which then prompted me to seek a different career).

In high school I found that baseball had new competition; girls, 3.2 beer and Bruce Springsteen. Unfortunately, the winter of my junior year I came home to a terrifying sight – my father holding up my report card with a 1.67 GPA. It didn't help that all five of my sisters had made some type of academic honor roll that quarter. It was one of the first times I felt true fright filtering through my body when my father pointed his finger at me and said, "If I ever see something like this again, you are all mine." I didn't know what "you're all mine" meant, nor did I want to find out. He also scolded me saying, "I'm the boss of this household, not

Springsteen." However, my stomach dropped when my dad said, "unless I see dramatic improvement, there will be no more baseball this spring." My body was shaking, realizing my dreams were about to blow up like a novelty cigar. It's funny what fear can do to you. The next quarter I came home with a shocking 3.8 GPA, which landed me back in the dugout. At that point I thought my greatest obstacles in life were over.

A few years later I entered law school (they obviously didn't know about the 1.67 report card), and a new source of anxiety grabbed hold of me the next three years – the dreaded Bar exam. The stress of taking the test followed me like a lingering ghost. The tension worsened that summer as I took a prep class and tried to cram all the legal knowledge into my small brain while being tormented by my sisters, who played New Kids on the Block on their stereo as I tried to study. Several lawyers cautioned me that passing the Bar came down to just one or two points, so I needed to make sure that I answered every question and essay whether I knew it or not.

As I prepared I realized there were two topics that scared me the most - commercial paper and the Interstate Commerce Clause. I understood nothing about either of those subjects, nor did I care to learn. It was like Calculus - when would I ever see it again? Attorney Craig Chessler (an all-county baseball player in his own right) gave me great advice on commercial paper when he advised, "On every essay, the fact pattern contains a thief. Use every legal principal and doctrine to blame it all on the thief." That made good sense to me. The morning of the Bar exam, I felt confident and selfassured until I read the third essay question. Suddenly I started sweating, butterflies filled my gut, and I could hardly breathe. I examined it closely for minutes, my mouth wide open, finally grasping it was on the Interstate Commerce Clause. I panicked, and my heart pounded while I tried to pull myself together. I recall it to be a very general question - something to the effect of "explain how the Interstate Commerce Clause effects our daily lives". I quickly lost my focus on the test and envisioned how I would tell my parents that I flunked the Bar. That's when baseball stepped across the plate and saved my legal career. I suddenly remembered as a boy reading about the landmark Supreme Court case involving the baseball player Curt Flood highlighted in the Sporting News and Sports Illustrated. I also watched a short, tenminute segment on the lawsuit a few months prior on that educational channel ESPN. Flood was an African American team captain and perennial 300 hitter for two St. Louis Cardinal World Championship teams in 1965 and 1967. He had the audacity to sue major league baseball (MLB) and Commissioner Bowie Kuhn, challenging baseball's claim that they had an "interstate commerce" exception to anti-trust laws. Flood focused on baseball's "Reserve Clause" that kept players from being free agents. Flood was enraged that he was traded to the Phillies without his consent. He requested to be deemed a free agent, which Kuhn denied, since MLB maintained a given team's rights to a player, even after the player's contract expired, until he retired.

At that point, desperate times called for desperate measures. So the Flood case became the whole subject of my response to the essay, as I pointed out that the Supreme Court acknowledged that professional baseball was a business, and engaged in interstate commerce, but was handed an exception and deemed an anomaly. Actually it was the only professional sport given this confounding privilege. Instead of immediately considering the facts of the case, the court offered a lengthy tribute to Major League Baseball and its effect on the United States. Although many legal scholars described the opinion as "senseless, chaotic and unprofessional", the Supreme Court stood by its exception to the Sherman Act that they carved out for America's pastime.

Thrilled that I had concocted some type of response to the question rather than leaving it blank, I finished the final portion of the rigorous exam as dejected and confused as everyone else. However, a big shock came a few months later when I found that I passed the Bar by a shoestring. Baseball had come to my rescue and I'd hit a home run. Interestingly enough, Curt Flood finally won his victory against MLB in 1988 when President Bill Clinton signed into law the Curt Flood Act, which overturned part of the 76 year old anti-trust exception. I will always admire Curt Flood's courage, moxie, and one-man stand that revolutionized major league players' rights. I also hope he's up there in heaven looking down with a smile on his face, knowing that his own personal battle had a strong influence on me and my legal career. As the great Brooklyn Dodgers Hall of Famer Jackie Robinson, who made his own dramatic impact on the diamond, once said, "A life is not important except for the impact it has on other lives."

 Congratulations to Stark County Attorney Avery Chiswell! In a span of one month he obtained a seven-figure jury verdict on a nursing home negligence case, obtained his FAA private pilot license, and has been selected as a contestant to appear on the reality television dating show, "The Bachelorette". We'll all be rooting for you!

### **50тн Year Spotlight**

#### Honorable Richard D. Reinbold, Jr.



How did you become an attorney?

I returned to Miami University, after 3 years in the Army, to finish my last semester as a junior and then finish, graduating in 1971. The job market was non-existent so with the advice and help of a professor I decided

to apply to law school. Then, with the help of friends, Akron admitted me in the fall of '72.

When you first graduated law school did you immediately know what area of law you were interested in practicing? Is that the area of law you started in? If not, how did you eventually get to the area of law that you primarily practiced in during your career?

My friend and I made at least a half-dozen trips to Washington DC during our 3rd year and interviewed every federal agency that existed. We actually interviewed the Justice Department the Friday before the "Saturday Night Massacre" when Nixon fired the US Attorney. We were not successful in our hunt.

I returned to Akron and, with the help of a young 3rd year law student named Scott Gwin, secured a position with the Canton Law Department. I left for 11 months for Washington where I had finally landed a job with the Labor Department.

I returned to Canton in March of 1976 (or 1776) after then Law Director Harry Klide offered me a position as an assistant city prosecutor. The journey from there to now is too lengthy to recount.

Did you have any legal mentors you really relied on during your career and how did they

#### help you develop your practice?

Harry Klide taught me perseverance and innovation; Judge Robert Mylett taught me to never (again) enter a court room unprepared; Bob Horowitz taught me "to sleep on it" before reacting to a negative; and Tom Borcoman and Paul Mastriacovo taught me how to try a case. And all my peers I grew up with.


What was one of the greatest legal achievements you look back on from your career? Passing the bar the first time.

What have been the things you treasure most about the practice of law over your career?

Looking back over the last 50 years, what advice would you give a new lawyer with respect to the outlook for their own career?

Jump in the river, let the current take you, grab a branch, if it is not what you want to do, jump back in the river.







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
